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I am pleased to present FAPAD's Annual Report 2022. In the pages that follow, we update you on the progress we have made in the 4th year of our Strategic Plan 2019/2023. We have continued to draw important lessons working in a challenging and rapidly changing civil society environment, with equally complex development issues.

As I write, the coronavirus pandemic has continued to ravage families and communities with its countless social, economic, and cultural legacies. The past year has for example seen rapid increases in domestic and sexual violence, especially on children, which has led to big numbers in child marriages and teenage pregnancies. Families are still grappling with job losses and the consequent poverty that have also fed into more violence and child abuse within families.

Perhaps the biggest stories on our 2022 chapter are that;

- 1. We launched a new 5-year sustainable livelihoods project targeting family farmers in Amolatar district.
- 2. Our Executive Director was one of the six finalists for the United States Institute for Peace (USIP) Women Building Peace Award 2022 because of her lifelong peace building work at FAPAD.
- **3.** We received the RIFA 2021 and the Trauma Research Fund Audience Choice Award 2022 awards for our collaborative film 'the Wound is Where the Light Enters'.

Meanwhile, we have continued to emphasize the importance of security sector reforms, and specifically the police system through leading conversations about legislative reforms. In addition, we continued to support security of tenure for indigents on the customary land system through provision of legal aid (alternative dispute resolution approaches) as well as support for certification.

We have worked hard to keep in stride with all the statutory requirements that continue to evolve and shape the operating space for CSOs. We will continue to reflect on the lessons we have learnt during the past years, while staying true to our mandate that places our beneficiaries – the women, children and other groups on the margins – at the forefront as we build resilient families and communities.

Finally, I want to acknowledge the extraordinary efforts of our staff and Board of Directors during the past year. You have all moved us a step further in achieving our goals. In the same measure, we value our strategic cooperation with government and strategic partners nationally and globally.

NATURAL RESOURCES & FOOD SECURITY

Enhancing Food Security for Family Farmer households through Agroecology in Lango and Rwenzori Regions

> In 2022, our flagship project strategically focused on improving food, nutrition and income security of family farmer households and youth in Awelo and Muntu sub counties in Amolatar district in Uganda. Specific objectives included;

Achievements



- Reached 865 farmer household members (419 male and 446 female) through awareness raising on agro ecology and sustainable farming systems.
- Farmers have adopted agro ecological principles and practices that ensure improved production in a resilient way.
- Collaborated with Amolatar district local government to build capacities of 875 farmers (486 male and 389 female) in environmental protection, conservation and management through awareness raising events.
- Communities have formulated by elaws that ensure protection of the natural resources.





Integrated Farm Plans

- Facilitated 108 farmer households to develop integrated farm plans, using an Integrated Planning approach tool developed by Wageningen University. The approach works through upscaling basis where graduated households recruit and support neighboring households in the development of their own household plans.
- Conducted needs assessment to identify community challenges attended by 118 (72 male and 46 female)
- Trained 114 households on integrated household approach.
- 24 cases of domestic violence, land conflict, and child neglect were resolved through alternative dispute resolution in collaboration with the Community Peace Promoters.
- Enhanced the capacity of youth on agro-based business models through enhancing the capacity of the youth group of 30 members on business development.
- Conducted capacity assessment on Youth enterprises and facilitated linkages to existing opportunities to build their skills and knowledge in poultry production and management.

Dealing with intersectional issues

- Strengthened the capacity of 5,476 farmer households on gender roles. This was through awareness creation using platforms such as community sensitization drives, radio talk shows and radio spot messages.
- Engaged the grassroots volunteer paralegal community structure "Community Peace Promoters" to extend the awareness campaigns.
- Strengthened the capacity of Local governments to adopt and actively promote agro-ecology.
- Facilitated lobby meetings with Muntu and Awelo sub county local governments to adopt Integrated Risk Management (IRM) sensitive activities to climate change in their plans and budgets. Key areas were tree planting, wetland demarcation and environmental awareness.

ACCOUNTABLE GOVERNANCE

Police Reforms

The Citizens' Initiative for Police Reform aims at promoting a pro-people and accountable police system in Uganda. Our flagship activities in the past year have been to support;

Retired Uganda Police Officers

- Pro-reforms ex-police officers nationwide to organize and strengthen their voices through the newly created Retired Uganda Police Officers' Association (RUPOA). RUPOA now has presence across the country and made inputs into the conversation about reforms. Regional/district based chapters included Mbale (Bugisu), Soroti (Teso), Masindi (Bunyoro) and Arua (west Nile).
- RUPOA collaborated with the Police system to contribute to better planning and training for the police.

Legislative reforms

- Worked with the Greater North Parliamentary Association (GNPA) to promote reforms through developing a bill to amend sections of the Police Act.
- From 26th November 2022 and 2nd December 2022, a team comprising members of the GNPA, Directorate of Legal Affairs (lead drafter) and FAPAD undertook a 4-day benchmarking visit to Nairobi Kenya to draw lessons from the Independent Police Oversight Authority (IPOA), the local CSO Usalama and the Kenyan Human Rights Commission.

A key output has been the development of a draft (amendment) bill.

GENDER JUSTICE Uganda's Civil Peace Service Program

Rights And Justice Activities (RAJA)

Rights and Justice Activities (RAJA) is a programme deliberately implemented to promote and deliver justice, increase awareness of justice, create awareness on rights of survivors to sexual reproductive Rights, land rights, child rights, women's rights, men's rights, rights of People Living with Disabilities, rights of other groups living on the margins and vulnerable people.

RAJA implements through a multi-sectoral approach with different stakeholders working together at different levels from grass roots to national levels. Stakeholder include the different justice actors like ; lawyers, magistrates, justices, probation and Welfare officers, Community development officers, police, community paralegals, community peace promoters, clan leaders, religious leaders, Local council leaders.

To monitor human rights violations and address violations by offering free legal aid services and referral pathways.

Achievements

- Held 2 public dialogue meetings on enhancing Legal Aid Service Provision in Uganda
- 1 legal awareness radio talk show in collaboration with actors of Justice, Law and Order sector
- 646 complainants of human rights violation in Lang managed through alternative dispute resolution mechanisms during mobile legal aid clinics and on-spot legal aid. Additional ser vices provided to beneficiaries included psychosocial and referral services to underscore the often-intersectional experiences they faced.

Responsible Land Policy In Uganda (RELAPU)

RELAPU aims at registering customary land to secure land rights especially for marginalized groups of people including widows, orphans, separated women, children born outside wedlock, elderly and persons with disabilities in Amwoma and Batta sub county in Dokolo district, Uganda

Achievements Systematic demarcation & mapping of parcels.

- 863 parcels of land belonging to 740 male headed and 123 Female headed households were mapped in Amwoma and Batta sub counties, Dokolo district, Uganda.
- 715 applications belonging to 609 male and 106 female-headed house holds related to the 863 parcels above were mapped for processing of certificates.
- By end of 2022, the cumulative total area of of parcels mapped was 2485.7213 hectares (Ha) since March 2020.

CONFLICT-RELATED SEXUAL VIOLENCE

Children Born of War (CBOW)

Collaborated with an interdisciplinary international team of academics and artistic practice that brought together academics, performance artists, choreographers, film producers and CBOW associated with CRSV in northern Uganda, and that further developed into the production of the documentary dance theatre 'In the Name of the Father', and a documentary film produced by Dheeraj Akolkar (Vardo film) 'The Wound is Where the Light Enters' which won the Arts and Humanities Research Council's Research in Films Award (Inspiration Category) in 2021, and the Trauma Research Fund's The Audience Choice Award 2022

Promoting Girls' Education: Keeping children in school

We collaborated with the American Council for Women, Peace and Security (ACWPS) to re-roofed 1 classroom block at Alao public primary school in Oyam district, northern Uganda.

Lessons Learnt

- 1. Escalating cases of domestic violence. This had effects on family social cohesion and household production.
- 2. Gross weather fluctuations in the first planting season damaged crops and affected production along the different value chains .
- **3.** Escalating levels of income poverty, which also affected quality of life, social cohesion within families and communities.
- **4.** Poor attitudes towards land registration funneled by suspicions and fear of land grab by government.
- 5. Gross Human rights violations on children and women in the communities.
- 6. Corruption hindering access to justice
- 7. Increase in land conflicts among close family members.
- 8. land conflicts emerging from the use of wetlands, which occupy large parts of Lango.
- 9. Survivors and communities affected by violent cattle raids in large parts of East Lango and East Acholi since 1986 struggle with serious long term social, economic, physical and mental health consequences of the CRSV and other harms they experienced linked to cattle raiders. Survivors were exposed to rape, abduction, and forced assimilation into their raiders' families in Karamoja, forced marriage, and forced pregnancies. Survivors continues to suffer associated legacies including ill health, stigma, poverty, and having to raise children born of the CRSV.
- **10.** Increasingly weakening civil society activism across all human rights and governance related sub fields nationally.

In 2023, We will;

- 1. Strengthen grassroots responses to domestic violence and child sexual abuse and exploitation.
- 2. Strengthen activism against violence against girls and women.
- 3. Develop the new 5-year strategic plan.
- 4. Promote Alternative Dispute Resolution and other peaceful methods for conflict resolution.
- 5. Provide Legal AID services to reduce and streamline the justice processes.
- 6. Conduct psychosocial support including through basic counselling, and strengthening pathways for referrals and Linkages with other justice actors.
- 7. Conduct more awareness creation through radio talk shows, community dialogues and mobile legal clinics on upholding human rights.
- 8. Empower local communities to solve land conflicts on a grass root level.
- 9. Promote sustainable use of wetlands.
- **10.** Conduct activities that promote legislative reforms in the police system across the country.
- **11.** Promote the voices and livelihoods of CRSV survivors linked to cattle raids, and their children.
- **12.** Strengthen collaborative initiatives between FAPAD, academia and artists to enhance research impact for life-changing work among communities.
- **13.** Develop research as an important dimension across all our work.
